Burn Permits Required - April 1st to October 31st

Information regarding burn permits, and regulations for open air burning can be found in By-Law 2024-27. For small campfires, property owners only need to apply once, and the permit will be valid for the lifetime that they own the home. Campfire permits are free, while a \$50 fee and advance notice are required for Brush or Windrow fires.



How to Get a Fire Permit in Bonfield

There are two easy ways to apply:

- 1. **In person** Visit the Township Office to fill out a fire permit application.
- 2. **Online** Download the form from our website, complete it, and submit it electronically.

Tips for safe burning

- Clear a space about two metres wide for the fire.
- Ensure you have a pail of water and a shovel to control the fire.
- Keep your fire small to a maximum of one metre high and one metre wide.
- Never leave a campfire unattended.
- When putting out your fire, use lots of water on the campfire.
 A good rule is to make sure the ashes look soaked and no more smoke comes from the ashes.

In an Emergency: Call 9-1-1

Clogged dryer vents are a leading cause of house fires. Stay safe—clean your lint trap after every load and have your dryer vent inspected and serviced regularly.





Consider choosing batteryoperated candles over real flames, especially around children, pets, and decorations.

Test smoke alarms and CO2 detectors at least once every six months

A good way to ensure the batteries in your smoke alarm are always fresh is to change them when you change your clock in the spring and fall.



Fire extinguishers are a vital tool in an emergency, as response times can vary depending on location.



- Placing extinguishers by the exit is essential so that you have the option of leaving if the fire is growing too fast.
- It is recommended to use a minimum 10lb ABC extinguisher.

Propane appliances that have been sitting for the entire winter can be hazardous if they are not maintained properly. Have them inspected and serviced by a qualified technician before using them.

BUILD AN EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS KIT

- ☐ food (enough for three days)
- □ bottled water (4 litres per person for each day)
- □ medication(s) for you and your pets
- \Box toilet paper and other personal items
- □ back up chargers and power banks
- ☐ flashlight, headlamp or glow stick
- ☐ radio (crank or battery-run)
- extra batteries
- ☐ first-aid kit
- hand sanitizer or moist towelettes
- ☐ important papers- copies of prescriptions, etc.
- ☐ gas for generator
- ☐ garbage bags and duct tape

EVECUATION PLAN

- Record your safe meeting places, make sure all household members are aware of the locations
- **Keep your plan in an easy-to-reach location.** A good place is with your emergency kit. Make sure everyone in your household knows where to find it.
- Review directions to turn-off utilities—including water valve, electrical panel and gas valve—and record them.

A PLAN FOR EVERY SEASON

Seniors and Vulnerable Residents

Seniors and vulnerable people may need extra help in an emergency. These are some additional steps to consider in an emergency.

Make a Plan

Safe Locations: Identify two safe locations—one nearby and one farther away.

Communication and Support Network Plan: Keep in touch who can assist, including family, neighbors, and healthcare providers.

Evacuation: Plan how to travel to safe locations and arrange for pets.

Living Situation: Consider specific needs based on your living environment. Remote locations needing more time for help to respond.

Build an Emergency Preparedness Kit:

Essentials: Include food, water, medications, PPE, chargers, cash, light sources, radio, batteries, first-aid kit, extra warm clothes and important papers.

Stay Informed: Listen to the radio for information about emergency situations.

Local Hazards: Be aware of hazards around you location and home.

Identification and Support Registry: Contact your local municipality to register as vulnerable persons who may need additional help in an emergency so first responders like EMS and Fire Department will be better prepared to help you.

Medical Information: Keep detailed records of medical conditions, medications, and individual needs.

Buddy System: Arrange for someone to check on you during emergencies.

Service Providers: Work with healthcare and support service providers to develop backup plans.



WHAT HAS CHANGED FOR RECYCLING IN BONFIELD?

All recyclables materials, including glass, plastic, cardboard and paper products can go into one recycling bin. No more separating items!



WHAT IS RECYCLING CONTAMINATION?



Recycling contamination occurs when materials are not properly cleaned, such as when food residue remains on a plastic yogurt container.

Rinse out containers before recycling them to ensure they are clean and free from contaminants.

Environmental Impact: Contamination can lead to recyclable materials being diverted to landfills instead of being recycled.

This increases the environmental footprint associated with waste disposal and contributes to pollution and greenhouse gas emissions.

Do your part to help mitigate the costs to the Township by ensuring all plastics and glass are properly cleaned before being recycled.

WASTE FREE ONTARIO

Ontario strives to move towards a circular economy — a system where products are not discarded, but are reused, recycled and transformed into new products.

The new recycling regulations shift the responsibility of managing recyclable materials from municipalities to producers—the businesses that supply packaging and paper products to consumers. This approach, termed Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR), makes producers fully accountable for the collection and recycling of their products once they reach the end of their life cycle.
