

Keep it Safe

Regardless of the type of open air fire you are having, always use caution.

NEVER use flammable liquids, such as gasoline, to start your fire.

- Remove all vegetation and other material that could spread the fire
- Maintain close supervision of children and pets
- Keep your fire on a non-combustible surface at least 15 meters from structures
- Have adequate supply of water available to extinguish or control the fire
- Pay attention to wind conditions and potential spark hazards

Be a Good Neighbour

While burning, it is your obligation to ensure that smoke does not interfere with the ability of your neighbours to enjoy their properties or conduct their business without disruption. Watch where your smoke travels and do not burn when there are smog alerts, foggy conditions or wind that will carry your smoke in a direction that will disrupt adjacent roadways or properties

OPEN AIR BURNING

The Ontario Fire Code prohibits all open air burning except for small confined cooking fires and other fires that have been “approved” by the Chief Fire Official.

What Is Open Air Burning (From April 1st to October 31st)

Any fire set outside (other than on a small confined grill) while being used to cook food. Campfires, brush/leaves, burn barrels and construction site fires are examples of open air burning. Fires may be started after 7:00 p.m.

The fire can't be any larger than 4 metres in diameter. You must have a minimum clearance of 15 metres from any structure, hedge, fence or anything combustible.

You must stay with the fire at all times until it is completely extinguished, and you must provide a means of extinguishment.

You cannot maintain a fire when the direction of the wind may cause either reduced visibility on a roadway or excessive smoke or an odour that may cause discomfort to persons in the immediate area. The fire must be out by 6:00 a.m.

Before Burning Ensure That

- It does not create a nuisance
- The fire is constantly attended
- A suitable means of extinguishment is available while the fire is burning

Open Air Burnings Are NOT Permitted When:

- Wind exceeds 15 kilometres per hour
- It is rainy or foggy
- A smog day has been declared

Burning Bans

At certain times of the year and as conditions warrant, the Fire Chief or the Ministry of Natural Resources may issue a complete ban on open air burning. When a ban is issued **ALL** open air burning is prohibited with the exception of actual cooking that is taking place on a grill.

Fire Station #1 has an answering machine with a message advising if a fire ban has been declared. Please do not leave a message.

Fire Danger Rating signs have been installed at the Township Office Entrance and at Gagné's Esso in Rutherglen

The Township's website will also post “Fire Bans”

Prohibited Materials

The following items are prohibited from burning: “industrial materials, such as tires, oil, grease, paint, cloth, rags, plastics, shingles, dry wall, insulation, painted or treated wood, animal fecal deposits or manure, animal carcasses, domestic waste such as food scraps, cloth, rags, clothing, household plastics and flammable or combustible liquids or accelerants”.

Penalties

Persons violating the Ontario Fire Code may be prosecuted under the **Fire Protection and Prevention Act**. Conviction may result in a fine up to \$25,000 dollars for an individual and \$50,000 for a Corporation.

Failure to comply with any provisions of this article may result in having your privileges revoked or being charged under the Ontario Fire Code and/or being charged \$410.00 per hour for each responding vehicle, or all of the above.

In addition, persons who conduct or permit open air burning, in contravention of the Open Air Burning By-Law, may be subject to fines/penalties as set out in the by-law.

Composting and recycling are encouraged
